Kill Your Lawn

Every house in America should be fronted with a non-native monoculture with the maintenance requirements of a golf course and the ecological value of a strip mine; a place where all flowers are called weeds and signs to the extent of 'keep off' are the norm.

Does the idea seem a bit odd to you? It's time to take a second look at this idea we call lawn. Join Dan Jaffe Wilder, author of *Native Plants for New England Gardens*, to learn about the various options available to us, from whole lawn replacement to strategies for reducing inputs and increasing ecological value. From well-known plants to new introductions, he will discuss various options that fit the needs of any lawn space.

Dan Jaffe Wilder is an ecologist, horticulturist, and botanist with over fifteen years' experience working with native plants and their associated ecology. His work has ranged from classrooms to nurseries to botanical gardens to wildlife refuges and specializes in native plant ecology, propagation, wildlife habitat construction, and native edible landscapes. Dan is the Director of Applied Ecology for the Norcross Wildlife Foundation whose mission is to protect, enhance, and expand wildlife through conservation, education, and support. A prolific photographer and author also, Dan's book *Native Plants for New England Gardens* was released in 2018.

Designing Your Garden For Lower Maintenance

At last month's well-attended Roundtable with Elaine Peterson, as attendees described their aspirations and wish lists, one theme that stood out was a desire to have a garden that requires less maintenance. There can be many circumstances that prompt us gardeners to want to simplify our workload. But that doesn't mean we have to sacrifice having a beautiful garden!

On the contrary, I recall a discussion I had a couple of years ago with member Lydia Wallis, who told me that she and her husband Jim had just completed a re-design of their garden, replacing high-maintenance plants with lower-maintenance varieties. That conversation led to an HAH member tour of Lydia's "new" and stunning garden. It occurred to me that this would be a wonderful topic for our next Roundtable, and I'm pleased to say that Lydia has agreed to attend and share her expertise and the story of her garden transformation. Lydia gardens in Southampton and among her many horticultural credentials, she is a Master Gardener and a past president of HAH. Elaine Peterson will also return and share her ideas as well, so this will be an especially interesting program!

Here are some of the topics we'll discuss:

- Evaluating your garden and your property
- Creating a sustainable garden using fewer resources
- Identifying high-maintenance areas and plants
- Removing plants that don't thrive
- Right plant, right place to reduce maintenance
- Garden thugs that require weeding or dividing
- Low-maintenance plant varieties
- Plants that need less watering
- Shade-loving plants that require less watering
- How good soil helps plants stay healthy with less care
- Mulching beds to reduce weeding and watering
- Planting dwarf and compact varieties for less pruning
- Incorporating native plants that require less care
- Using your food and garden trimmings to create nourishing compost and fewer trips to the dump
- Choosing plants for your type of soil
- Adding hardscaping and other garden features to reduce areas requiring maintenance

By the end of the program, if there are attendees who have unanswered gardening questions about these or any other topics, please feel free to stay a while longer and talk to one of our knowledgeable members. See you on March 2.

THINK SPRING-THINK GARDEN FAIR 2024 DIGS

Preview Party, Friday, May 17, Garden Fair, Saturday, May 18

For those of you who are newer members of the HAH and are not familiar with the "Digs" Section of our Garden Fair, let me explain. The Digs were started in 1998. We organize a group of members to go to another member's or friend's garden and dig, divide, pot up and label plants for our garden fair.

This is 100% profit for the HAH.

Does your garden qualify for a Dig? It does if it's overgrown, you have too many plants and would like some help in digging and dividing them, you're redesigning your garden and don't have space for all your plants or you can no longer physically dig yourself. Let us know and we'll organize a group for some time at the end of April or beginning of May, depending upon the weather. We bring the tools, the pots, the labels and the soil for potting. (We already have three gardens on the calendar!)

Newly potted plants are divided up among the diggers who will care for them until the sale. That means placing them in indirect light, watering and grooming so they are in tip top condition (this saves a lot of time on Friday) when dropped off Friday morning. We need the afternoon for pricing. Remember to ask yourself, would you buy this plant the way it looks if it was at the local nursery?

Would you like to meet fellow members and make new friends? This is the ideal opportunity for you to volunteer to help dig or offer your garden for a Dig. It's a good learning experience and a lot of fun. Sometimes you even get to take home a plant or two for yourself!

We're interested in perennials, ground covers, biennials, small shrubs and saplings. Please note, we cannot come and dig out the 5' hedge you no longer want!!



UNDER THE SHADE OF A TREE....a book review

Queen Elizabeth in the Garden: A Story of Love, Rivalry and Spectacular Gardens, written by Trea Martyn

After watching a PBS TV documentary about the English Boleyn family from the 1500's, I was quite surprised to come across a book in our John LoGerfo Library featuring Queen Elizabeth and her garden. She was the daughter of Anne Boleyn and King Henry VIII. You may recall that Anne was beheaded in 1536 by orders of the king, leaving behind a 3 year old daughter, Elizabeth.

The story follows Elizabeth's passion for gardens and nature. Robert Dudley and William Cecil were the two most powerful men in England during her reign. They vied for Elizabeth's attention by enhancing their garden designs, adding exquisite scents, hiding music among the plants, creating fanciful water features and offering the thrill of rare and foreign fruits and plants. They tried to outdo each other with more and more extravagance and Queen Elizabeth loved it all!

Authored by Trea Martyn, who has taught garden and landscape history in many universities in London, it is an absorbing read full of amazing facts and fascinating English events in this time frame. If you have a special feeling for both gardens and history, this is a perfect choice for you.

Springtime in Bloom—A New England Garden Tour May 1 and 2, 2024

Green Animals Topiary Garden | Sakonnet Garden | Garden in the Woods

Wednesday, May 1, Portsmouth and Little Compton, RI

- Pick ups in Bridgehampton and Hampton Bays. Members on the North Fork may choose to park at the ferry terminal in Orient Point and join us from there. We will ferry to New London, then drive on to Rhode Island. Please pack a lunch or plan to purchase food on the ferry.
- Our first stop will be Green Animals Topiary Garden. This is the oldest and northernmost topiary garden in the country and features more than 80 topiary animals and other figures.
 Green Animals is recognized by the American Daffodil Society as one of just 28 official Daffodil Display Gardens in the United States.
- Our second stop will be Sakonnet Garden. Sakonnet is a "secret garden" with multiple paths
 leading onward to unexpected experiences. Now larger than an acre, the garden is divided into
 rooms by high windbreak hedges and stone or timber walls that create microclimates the
 owners exploit to dazzling effect. Each room reflects their ongoing experiments with lighting,
 space, color mixing, collecting, and growing great plants.
- We then drive to Framingham, MA where we will spend the night at the Fairfield Inn & Suites by Marriott Framingham. Dinner on your own. Continental breakfast is included.

Thursday, May 2, Framingham, MA

• Garden in the Woods is a 45 acre woodland botanical garden and the largest landscaped collection of wildflowers in New England. The best time to visit is in the spring, when the blooms of trillium, trout lily, Virginia bluebell, pink lady's slipper orchid, woodland phlox, and more cover the forest floor. We will have an opportunity to shop for native woodlanders to support the mission of the Native Plant Trust.

Cost based on a minimum of 20 participants:

\$415/person which covers transportation, garden admissions, breakfast and lunch on Thursday

- If 25 participants register, we can lower the cost to \$355/person.
- If 30 participants register, the cost will be \$315/person.
